## **Rescuers Take Action for Steve the Pelican**

There are so few services for injured and orphaned wildlife in our state. That's why we started our Wildlife Rescue 911 program; HSLA workers and volunteers frequently step up to help injured wild creatures, transporting them to local vets and licensed wildlife rehabilitators. We're now hoping that one special bird will overcome his injuries, so that he can live out a happy life. Over the last few months, people in Grand Isle befriended a pelican with an injured wing; he had been frequenting a local pier. Unable to fly, the poor bird walked around, seeking handouts from local fisherman, tourists and residents. People became so friendly with the pelican that they named him Steve. Just recently, a caring woman named Alison - after visiting the area - felt that she must take some kind of action to help. She called the Louisiana Department of Wildlife And Fisheries. As usual, they offered no assistance for the injured state bird, suggesting that nature simply be allowed to take its course. Undeterred, Allison called HSLA, and we explained to her that a rescue would involve catching Steve with a fish net and transporting him to the LSU Vet School. She and her husband agreed to make the 5-hour round trip trek back to Grand Isle and then on to Baton Rouge with the injured bird. The couple was able to successfully get the wounded bird into a dog carrier and safely to LSU.
