A Lifeline for Community Cats



Requests to help community cats and their caregivers have increased dramatically across Louisiana. With more cats being abandoned and joining established colonies, the need for action is more urgent than ever. Increasingly, new cats appearing at colonies aren't truly feral but are abandoned pets with nowhere else to go. This situation is made worse by the rising costs of vet care and the lack of available low-cost spay-neuter programs. The problem can sometimes seem overwhelming, but it can be tackled one colony at a time. We partner with dedicated feline advocates like Amber Richard to make a difference. Amber has been managing a challenging colony in Basile, Acadia Parish. This months-long effort began in

July, focusing on a colony fed by an elderly woman. So far, an additional 20 cats have been neutered, and over 40 have been relocated to seven managed colonies, thanks to Amber's networking. This work is labor-intensive and costly, but with teamwork and community support, we can bring situations like these under control. If you're a cat lover, there are many ways to help.
