CONCORDIA PARISH DOG SAVED FROM A LIFETIME OF ABUSE



Poor **King Charles** was severely abused for most of his life. According to neighbors who witnessed the ongoing cruelty, his owner beat him regularly, fed him poorly and left him tied outside in the rain without shelter. Luckily, the Vidalia Police Department conducted a thorough investigation and was able to document a clear case of cruelty. Officers on the scene took custody of the poor dog and sought urgently needed medical attention for his many injuries. We were glad we could step in to pay KC's vet bills, as requested. Most small animal control or law enforcement agencies have no budget for veterinary bills, meaning that animal abuse victims often go without needed medical care, unless we are able to intervene. The former owner, Rhonda Guillot, 64, has been cited for cruelty to animals. Our partnerships with law enforcement agencies across the state helps to ensure more abused and neglected animals get the help they

Our Wildlife Rescue Team was able to save these 3 mallard ducklings, who had fallen down a drainage basin in New Orleans East. To reach the ducklings, rescue team members pried open a manhole and lifted the cover off the basin. A team member lowered himself down a short shaft and emerged a few seconds later with the three ducklings. Since the mother duck could not be found, the little birds were delivered to a local wildlife rehabilitator.



We're not sure how poor little **Oreo** survived - his head was stuck in a fence for several days in Catahoula parish, with no one to help him. Luckily, Kelly Roy rushed to the rescue and was able to get an officer involved, who freed the pup. When Kelly later visited the precinct with the puppy wrapped in a blanket, one of the officers behind the front desk showed a lot of interest and commented on how cute the little guy was.
