55 Kitties Saved in One Lifesaving Transport!

We've all had so much bad news in recent months, we're happy to report at least one positive and unanticipated benefit of the recent pandemic. As Covid-19 has introduced many difficult changes to our lives, many people have used the additional time at home to welcome new cats and dogs into their families. Apparently, social distancing has created a perfect opportunity for adoptions. People are also seeing how much animal companions can enrich their lives. Shelters and rescues across the country are being emptied out, as the demand for homeless cats and dogs for adoption has increased. As the nation tentatively opens up again, this presents an exciting, new opportunity for homeless animals here in the South. We are delighted that we've been receiving many calls from our regular adoption partners and other great rescues up north, who are all in need of homeless animals for adoption. Working with local shelter partners, we've recently been able to help make four lifesaving transports back to back. We've already saved hundreds of precious lives by transporting over 400 animals to our no-kill partners in just the last few weeks! In the past, the need up north was primarily for dogs - mostly puppies. While that demand remains and has increased, there's even an additional need for kittens these days. One of our rescue partners recently pre-approved 55 cat adoption applications for families eagerly awaiting kittens. We're so pleased to report that something good has come out of all the recent heartache. We'll do all we can to save as many animals as possible in the coming months. Some of the kitties from the adorable '55 Kitten Transport' are pictured below - along with a few puppies who recently got their ticket out of the South, too.



Our ongoing food relief programs are helping people like Frank and cats like Kitty. Frank had fallen on hard times last vear and was living at a New Orleans shelter, when he met and fell in love with a sick. homeless kitten near the facility. With no resources or a ride, he reached out to the Humane Society last year, and we were able to get Kitty needed médical care. Frank has since gotten a new place and HSLA is pitching in to get Kitty fixed this week. We also provided the pair with free cat food through our Covid-19 program.

ARREST made in violent attack on New Orleans woman and her dogs

Victoria Elmwood and her dogs were assaulted in a violent recent attack in the Bywater area of New Orleans. In an incident captured on security cameras, a man accosted Elmwood as she walked her pets, kicking her dogs viciously. He even tried to stomp on the head of one of poor animals. Luckily, Ms. Elmwood and her dogs escaped; she contacted the police department and HSLA. We were at the scene, when a neighbor spotted the suspect just a few blocks away. The victim quickly relayed the information to the NOPD's Fifth District. Officers responded quickly, and we were delighted to witness the arrest of the accused, Alexander Miller, as he was put into the police car. Miller was charged with assault and cruelty to animals and jailed. We will monitor this case through the court system and continue to assist in any way we can.
